### A Word from Our Interim Pastor

Dear Church Family,

One of my favorite verses in all scripture is found in John 16:33, where Jesus said, "...in the world vou will have tribulation, but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." Now, there are those who believe that the second phrase cancels out the first, so if you have enough faith, you won't have any problems in this world. Not only is that wrong, it twists what Jesus said. What it does mean is that if we are in Christ, He will always be there for us, no matter what comes our way, and in Him we will ultimately be victorious. So, all people, including all Christians, will have problems in this world. However, unlike the rest of the world, those who are in Christ have a very present help in times of trouble (Psalm 46:1). Certainly, there were none closer to the Lord than those who wrote down the scriptures, as they were inspired by God himself, and yet we find phrases in scripture like, "I am weary with my sighing; every night I make my bed swim; I dissolve my couch with my tears" (Psalm 6:6). It is obvious here and in other places in scripture that the Psalmist and others did not have a life which was free of problems and heartache, but they knew above all, that God was always with them.

There is an interesting scripture found in Psalm 56:8, which is, "You have taken account of my wanderings. Put my tears in your bottle. Are they not in your book?" This scripture reflects a custom of the people of the ancient world. When they experienced tragedy, they would actually collect their tears and put them in a bottle, and as they looked at the bottle of tears, they would be reminded of the difficult times they had experienced in the past, and this helped them to appreciate the good times and not take life for granted. The Psalmist is saying that his tears are also in God's bottle, and as God looks at them, he is reminded of all the troubles the Psalmist has been through, and has not forgotten him. For all of us in Christ who are hurting, we know there is a God who loves us, who remembers us, and who cares about us. He will never leave us nor forsake us, and we can cast all our cares on Him, because He cares for us. Those are promises from the Lord, and He always keeps his promises.

Sue and I had a wonderful time at my granddaughter's wedding, and also enjoyed visiting with some of her family in Palestine, Texas, and some of my family in Memphis, Tenn. Long trip, short visit, and we were glad to get back home, and glad to see all of you in church on Sunday. We are looking forward to being a part of all that God has in store for our church.

### Remembering Billy Graham

I was a sophomore in high school when I learned that a Billy Graham crusade was coming to my hometown of San Antonio. I had heard of Billy Graham all my life and had some huge expectations as I headed to the Alamodome to hear him speak. Some big names were to lead worship before he spoke. I can't remember all the artists, but Amy Grant was one of them. The arena was packed as Billy Graham took the stage. To my surprise, he didn't deliver some grand oration. He stood stationary behind a pulpit and delivered a straight-forward gospel presentation similar to what I was used to hearing from the pastor of my church week in and week out. When he finished his message, he offered an invitation. I watched astonished as people came pouring down the aisles toward the floor of the stadium. I was actually confused as to what was going on. Never had I seen someone preach a simple gospel message that resulted in hundreds of people responding in that way!

William Franklin Graham Jr. (Billy) was born on November 7, 1918 and was known for the crusades he held around the world. In these crusades he challenged world views shaped by society and culture by presenting the gospel of Jesus Christ. These crusades lasting from 1947 to 2005 along with other outreach endeavors including radio and television ministry allowed Billy the opportunity to present the good news to as many as 2.2 billion people in more than 185 countries and territories. He preached the gospel to more people in person than any man in Christianity's history. Graham was a spiritual advisor to several presidents during his lifetime and was particularly close with Lyndon B. Johnson. He played a large role in desegregation and partnered with Martin Luther King Jr. on occasion in advocating racial integration. In fact, he even bailed King out of jail once. Billy Graham was on the Gallop's list of most admired men and women on 61 occasions- more than any other person in history.

Billy was born in a farm house in Charlotte, North Carolina to a dairy farmer and his wife. He was raised on the dairy farm along with his three siblings. Though he was brought up in the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, but would later be ordained as a Southern Baptist Minister. Graham was once turned down from membership in a local youth group for being "too worldly." After that he was convinced to meet with evangelist Mordecai Ham. Billy was 16 years old when Ham led him to Christ at a revival in Charlotte. He attended college at Bob Jones University and Florida Bible Institute where he came to believe that the Bible was the infallible Word of God. Graham married Ruth Bell and remained married to her for 64 years until Ruth died at age 83. They had five children together, 19 grandchildren, and 41 greatgrandchildren, many of which have become leaders of large ministries. His son, Franklin Graham, is the president and CEO of both the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association and Samaritan's Purse, the organization that has helped our area on multiple occasions with disaster relief and is the parent organization of the Operation Christmas Child shoebox ministry our church participates in each fall.

Billy Graham served in a number of ministry positions ranging from Bible college president and chaplain in the Armed Forces, to an evangelist and revival preacher. He passed away on February 28, 2018 at the age of 99 and will never be forgotten for the difference he made in our world. I will never forget the lesson I learned from Billy Graham. God used a small-town kid from a dairy farm in North Carolina to take His message of salvation to billions around our world. We don't need to be the most talented and attractive people to make a difference in our world for Christ. In fact, the Bible tells us that God likes to use the weak and foolish things of this world because His strength is shown great in our weaknesses (1 Cor. 1:27; 2 Cor. 12:9). We just need to be faithful to share his message of hope and seek His strength as we do so. I love you and love being your Worship Pastor!

### One in five American adults raised in religiously mixed homes

WASHINGTON (RNS)—In another sign indicating the United States is a diverse country, a new poll reveals one in five American adults grew up in a family with more than one religion.

The poll, conducted by the Pew Research Center, also found most of those raised this way had one Protestant or Catholic parent and one religiously unaffiliated sometimes called a "None"—parent.

"To be sure, religiously mixed backgrounds remain the exception in America," the report on the poll states. "But the number of Americans raised in interfaith homes appears to be growing."

That's because more Millennials—27 percent—are raised in religiously mixed homes than any other generation to date. And about the same number of young people—24 percent—say they were raised by at least one parent who did not have a religious affiliation.

### The poll also revealed:

People raised by at least one parent with no religious affili- that took place in 2012. (2017) ation are more likely to be unaffiliated themselves (60 percent)—the same retention rate as those raised by Catholic parents.

Children with two Catholic parents are more likely to remain Catholic (62 percent). But those raised with only one Catholic parent have a 50-50 chance of being Catholic as adults.

Eighty percent of those raised in a Protestant-only home remain Protestants—but that number drops to 56 percent if How have you been personally affected by environmenone parent is a religious None. In either case, there is a lot of "religious switching" in Protestant families, as only one -quarter of those raised by at least one Protestant parent remain in that parent's denomination.

More people say their mother, rather than their father was mostly responsible for their religious upbringing, and those raised in mixed-faith homes are more likely to identify with their mother's faith.

The study was conducted among 5,000 U.S. adults and has a margin of error of 2.0 percentage points.

Besides keeping our focus, how does the Prophet Micah say we are to respond to who God is? Read Micah 6:6-8.

Verse 11

Why do you think this verse is repeated twice in this Psalm (see verse 7 also)?

How is the thought in verse 11 amplified in the following verses, and how does each one encourage you? Psalm 2:1-6, 10-12, 37:1-7, 61:1-5, 62:1-2; Isaiah 40:21-31; Zechariah 14:1-9.

### TEXAS BAPTIST MEN UPDATE

The Texas Baptist Men (TBM) Board of Directors met February 16 an 17. I was privileged to be there and hear the various ministry reports. Since our Church supports TBM some of the reports might be of interest to you.

TBM is most widely known for Disaster Relief Ministry. TBM was involved with 21 total responses and three in other states. In Hurricane Harvey alone TBM provided 349,266 volunteer hours. In 2017 TBM provided 33,379 volunteer days; served 1,605,515 meals; provided 30,032 showers; washed and dried 16,345 loads of laundry; gave out 51,549 boxes, did 2,941 rebuild projects; 2,577 mud out jobs and 1,116 chainsaw jobs; and provided 2,511 heavy equipment hours. During all this there were 15,294 ministry contacts that led to 265 professions of faith and 5,592 bibles handed out.

What I didn't know was that FEMA requires disaster relief matching funds from the State of Texas. Credit is given for "contributions in kind" which includes volunteer hours. So the logged volunteer hours in Hurricane Harvey saved the State of Texas at least \$8.4 Million in matching funds for disaster relief, not to mention what homeowners and others saved.

Wish there was space to more than mention some other areas.

There were amazing reports of TBM Water Ministry work in Peru, Ghana, Kenya, Philippines, Honduras and the Navaho Nation in New Mexico. Hygiene training has been added to water well drilling and water purification because of the lack of knowledge of locals. Also training was provided in making soap from local materials. This not only allows better local hygiene, but also allows local women to generate income from soap sales.

TBM Restorative Justice Ministry is very active with ministry to both inmates, families of inmates and prison guards and staff. Victims Relief is a growing area of ministry.

Rebuild is a new area for TBM. This involves long term recovery projects rebuilding disaster destroyed homes and buildings. Presently Rebuild Projects are in progress at Kingsland Baptist Church in Katy; University Baptist Church in Clear Lake; Navy Housing at the Port of Orange and First Baptist Church in Rockport.


