A Word from Our Interim Pastor

I am writing this article, having just returned home from spending the weekend in the hospital in Galveston. On Saturday night, May 12, at 10:30pm, I began bleeding profusely, went to the emergency room in Angleton, and was transferred to Galveston via ambulance around 2am. On Mother's Day I was prepped for a colonoscopy, had the procedure on Monday, and was discharged on Tuesday, getting back home around 4:30pm. As it turned out, the bleeding was a result of the radiation I had back in 2014, following the prostate surgery. Who would have ever thought that a side effect from radiation therapy would show up four years later. Until that night, I had never had any side effects, nor any warning signs. Now, I suppose you are wondering why I am telling you all of this, but I want to show you how God works. Sue and I had returned from May by the Bay on Thursday afternoon, and then had driven to Nacogdoches on Friday for Sue's granddaughter's graduation ceremony from Stephen F. Austin on Saturday. Sue's daughter and the rest of their family was planning to stay Saturday night as well, and Sue was going to stay with them while I drove back so I could be at church on Sunday. At the last minute, Sue decided to come back with me. Nobody but the Lord knew that Sue would need to be with me, so that she could drive me to the hospital. I'm sure that I could have found someone else to take me, but Sue would have been a basket case if she had stayed in Nacogdoches an extra night, and I would have had a tough time being in the hospital under those circumstances without her being there with me. Thank you, Lord, for all of your bountiful blessings, and for always being there for your children.

And speaking of thanking the Lord...I know that we all are thanking the Lord for the newly elected Pastor Search Committee. I know that a lot of pray was involved in both the nominating process and the election process, and I think we have a wonderful committee. As we begin the search process, please continue to lift up each one of the committee members on a daily basis. They are: Clifford Johnson, chairman, Peggy Anderson, recording secretary, Kelly Creech, Susie Munsch, Chris Beanland, Mark Higginbotham, alt., and Becky Newton, alt. Pray that we will be sensitive to the Lord's leadership in this search process, and that we will choose exactly the man that God has for our new pastor.

As I write this article, the results of the Youth Pastor Search Committee are not in, but please begin praying for this committee as well. And continue to pray for our church as a whole, so that we will be ready to move forward, and fulfill God's plan for Arcadia FBC.

I love working with each of the staff members at Arcadia FBC, and count it a privilege to serve alongside them. They all love the Lord and are committed to serving Him as they serve in our church. Be thankful for our great staff, and pray for them regularly.

With summer camps, VBS, Upwards, Mission Trips, and Mission Santa Fe we are able to reach more people with the gospel than in other seasons. We have a great opportunity this summer to reach out to the children and youth in our community since we don't have to compete as much with homework and extracurriculars. Let's take advantage of it!

You might not relate well to children and youth, but there are several opportunities to engage adults with the gospel as well. Once a month we have our "Outreach

Sunday." The next Sunday this will take place is June 24th. On those days, we meet at the church at 4:00pm, break off into teams of 2 or 3 and take gift bags to people who have visited our church or who have children involved in our MDO or school. As we are given the opportunity, we engage them with the gospel. Sharing the gospel with someone may be difficult for you and it might require that you go out in a visitation group a few times to learn how to do it before sharing yourself, but I want to challenge you to participate. Sometimes we just need an extra person to come along and make casual conversation with the people we are visiting. You may be surprised how much you enjoy it!

Also, Mission Santa Fe is scheduled for July 23-27. Please mark your calendars. There are opportunities to participate in ministry all week long. If you aren't 4. According to the CDC, children are more likely to good with kids or youth, consider helping us with our afternoon mission projects. There's something for everyone. My article for next month will include more details on Mission Santa Fe. You can sign up in the foyer of the sanctuary. If your schedule doesn't allow you to participate in our summer church-led outreach, remem-5. You can and should serve as a missionary to the people you encounter day in and day out. Matthew 28:19-20, Jesus challenges us to be His witnesses and to carry His good news to the ends of the earth. There are multiple opportunities for you to minister and share the gospel this summer and I hope you'll participate in as much as you are able! Have a great summer! Voices: Does church size matter?

A few years ago, The National Congregational Study posted some findings on the average church size in America. They discovered quite

a bit about church sizes and trends, but two specific stats rang out

- *Half* of American churches have less than 75 people.
- Ninety percent of American churches have less than 350 peo-

What was it about these stats that made my pastoral spidey senses go off?

Well, I thought America was in the middle of a megachurch boom. Conversations about church growth are on the rise, newly minted denomination-neutral worship facilities are popping up in every major city, and it seems that every keynote speaker at every conference is the pastor of a large church somewhere.

Country, community and neighborhood churches are wringing their hands with worry about attendance because they've been told they should be growing (or that they could be growing if they'll just nificant in the eternal sense, but it's also substantial today in the subscribe to so-and-so's simple five-week course for only \$99.99).

With this current church-growth trend running full bore, whether it's outright said or just subtly implied, the message is loud and clear: big church good, small church bad.

A typical pastoral conversation

Just ask any pastor what the first two questions other pastors ask him when they meet for the first time. Nine times out of ten, the conversation goes as follows:

"Oh, you're a pastor? What church do you pastor?"

"I pastor at First Baptist Church of Somewhere, Texas."

"That's great! How many people do you have on a Sunday?"

That second question is rarely about their tenure of service, what it's like to pastor in Somewhere, Texas, or if they even enjoy the job. That second question is generally, "How many people?"

I wouldn't speak for any other pastors other than myself on this, but when I receive the question of how many people I minister to on a Sunday, I almost hear it with the hidden inquiries of, "Are you a good pastor or not? Should I respect you because you have more people in your church than I have in mine?"

Like I said, I could be alone here, but I'm willing to venture a guess that I'm not.

Sizing up success

It's not that growth and size are bad. That's far from what I'm saying. Keeping count of people in crowds has a biblical tradition, and it helps understand the effectiveness of new stuff we're trying in services and other beneficial things along those lines. We also can't ignore that the fewer people who are in the church, the more difficult it may be to keep all of the bills paid.

To add to that, some churches are called to be large. The influence that having large numbers creates is priceless in the kingdom. Ultimately, the only reason Rome and the Pharisees took Jesus seriously is because of how many people followed him. If his followers were in the dozens rather than the thousands, they likely wouldn't have cared about him.

No, I'm not railing against large churches. I'm concerned with the practice of using the size of a church as the only means of judging success.

If consciously or subconsciously we associate the sheer size of a church with its success, then we've got a pretty big problem on our hands when we look at the stats mentioned above. Are 90 percent of the churches in our country that bad? Are 90 percent of our pastors failures?

If you talk to many pastors, they'd say yes. Well, what they'd

more likely answer is that they think of themselves as failures for not leading a more substantial body. I may be preaching to the praise team here, but believing that church size is all that matters is wrong, and it's time for a change.

The church began small

Nowhere in the Bible does Jesus tell us that all churches are supposed to look the same. All congregations all called to follow some overarching principles of worship and discipleship, but, aside from those, we all have a different purpose in the kingdom, and those objectives don't all look alike.

Simply put, some churches need to be huge, but, clearly, most do not. Remember how God looks at the inward stuff while humanity has a bad habit of looking at the outward (1 Samuel 16:7)? God has just as much interest in the quality of a church as he does the quan-

Are you praying for the sick? Shepherding the flock? Teaching the word faithfully? Are you making disciples of your people? How about regularly sharing the good news of Jesus with the lost? Are you a good steward of your resources? Then don't stress out over how many pockets are in the multipurpose, padded chairs.

You may not hear this often enough, but, pastor, you're doing a good job. Trust that your work for the Lord is meaningful. It's sighere and now.

Remember that Jesus needed just twelve men to spark a revolution. Believe that if it's full of faithful people, God can do tremendous things in a tiny church.

tucky. Can we pray now for Tyler Shields, our Army National Guard chaplain?





Rest for the Weary - 4th Commandment

We live in a time-crunched world. Parents whip up a quick breakfast for bleary-eyed children before bundling them into cars to be dropped off at day-care and school. Some grab a drive-through burrito before negotiating traffic on the freeways while juggling cell phones. Weary from long hours at work, the same commuters make their way home past memorized billboards. Weekends are filled with a hundred errands, second jobs, T-ball, soccer, football. Church is squeezed into an already full schedule that has no margins.

The opioid crisis in America may be a symptom of our overextended and anxious culture. Overdose deaths have quadrupled since 1999. Over 42,000 Americans died of opioid overdose in 2016. The National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Addiction stated, "Readily available opioids have become "drugs of solace" that mask physical and emotional pain in a world offering little hope that conditions will improve."

A recent report from the American Psychological Association stated, "Chronic stress is increasingly eating away at our overall well-being." ... "The psychological and physical toll of stress in America will undoubtedly continue to snowball if something doesn't change."

Somewhere along the way we eliminated the fourth commandment as irrelevant and archaic: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." A half-century ago, most businesses were closed on Sunday and youth sporting events recognized Sunday as a day for worship. All that has changed. Today our calendars are filled up to a 24/7 frenzy.

When Jesus said that man was not made for the Sabbath but the Sabbath was made for man, he affirmed the need for the Sabbath in our lives. He underscored the importance of the Sabbath to all of us for mental, emotional, spiritual and physical health.

In 1924 Scotland's Eric Liddell, the fastest runner in the world, refused to compete at the Olympics on the Sabbath. When the King of England commanded him to run for his country on Sunday, Liddell respectfully replied he had a higher king. The Academy Award winning movie, *Chariots of Fire* portrays Liddell reading Isaiah 40:31 to a congregation on Sunday while young men stumble and fall on the mud-splattered track. "Those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength; they will mount up with wings like ea-

gles, they will run and not get tired, they will walk and not faint." The next week, Liddell ran the 400 meter and won the gold. In 1925 he gave up his athletic career to serve as a missionary in China where he died 20 years later in a Japanese prison camp.

Sabbath requires time for rest, silence, solitude and worship, but it is more than a day of rest. It is a way of life that is filled with wonder, worship, awe and delight. When Jesus declared himself the Lord of the Sabbath, he offered to us a better way. He said, "Come unto me all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest to your souls."

NO BAKE WHITE CHOCOLATE RASPBERRY CHEESECAKE

Ingredients:

Raspberry Sauce:

2 ½ cups frozen raspberries, thawed

2 tablespoons water

½ cup sugar

1 tablespoon cornstarch

Graham Cracker Crust:

2 ½ cups graham cracker crumbs (or ½ cup butter, melted Chocolate baking crumbs)

Filling:

1 cup white chocolate chips

1 cup heavy cream, divided

24 oz. light cream cheese (3 packages)

1 ½ cups powdered sugar

1 tsp. vanilla

1 ½ cups fresh raspberries

Instructions:

Raspberry sauce:

- In a small pot, add the raspberries and sugar. Bring to a simmer over medium heat and cook for 2-3 minutes. Mash with a spatula.
- Combine water and corn starch and stir into sauce to thicken. Set aside to cool completely (you can speed this up by pouring into a new bowl and placing in the fridge).

Crust

- Optional: Clamp a piece of parchment paper in between the bottom and the outer ring of a 9" Springform pan. This helps with easy removal.
- In a medium bowl, combine graham cracker crumbs and melted butter. Press into the bottom and 1" up the sides of a 9-10" springform pan. Set aside.

Filling:

- In a medium bowl, stir together white chocolate and ½ cup cream. Microwave on high for 40 seconds, then stir until completely smooth (heat another 15 seconds, if necessary). Place in the fridge to cool.
- In a large bowl, beat cream cheese with an electric mixer until smooth. Add sugar, vanilla, and remaining ½ cup cream and beat on high until light and fluffy.
- Add melted white chocolate and beat on medium speed until blended.
- Place fresh raspberries into the bottom of the crust and pour the cheesecake filling over top, smoothing with a spatula.
- Drop teaspoonfuls of raspberry sauce on the top, and gently swirl. Save remaining sauce for serving
- Chill at least 5 hours or overnight before serving. Serve with remaining raspberry sauce and fresh raspberries as desired.
